

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Well, it's another new year - and on behalf of the Council I hope that you all have a good one.

"Keep Britain Tidy" have asked if we would like to become involved in the Great British Spring Clean on the weekend of **March 2nd to 4th** and we have registered to take part. Keep an eye on the Notice Board for details posters and information about just what we all need to do.

Electrical work has been undertaken in No 1 *Church Cottages* and further work is scheduled.

The *playing field* fence is to be replaced and remedial work to be carried out on the play equipment. If we are lucky we may get help with the funding for this from West Devon Communities Funding.

There is only one *planning application* at the moment with Dartmoor National Park (0630/17) being the conversion of the residential barn at Sunnyside to a holiday let. The Parish Council is supporting this application.

The Council has had its meeting regarding the *precept* and, you will be pleased to note, that it has been decided to ask for $\pounds 10,500$ which is exactly the same as last year - so if there is any increase it's not down to the Parish Council!

We are trying to get the *leaf sweeper* into the village as a matter of urgency, it is supposed to come around every eight weeks but this does not seem to be happening. You may have noticed that a lot of the drains had been cleared by the Lengthsman so helping to alleviate any flooding that could have been caused by blocked drains.

The Council raised a Freedom of Information request regarding the *junction of the A386* with the road to Peter Tavy asking just how many accidents have there been at this junction? The request has now been answered and we are told that there have been FOUR incidents in the last ten years. The Council is concerned about the safety of this junction and so would like to ask all parishioners to report any incidents to the Parish Clerk, by email or telephone, in order that we can keep our own records. If we keep a record it would give us a little leverage to get some sort of change made. - Thanks

The Council has given a donation of £100 to the *Citizen's Advice Bureau* as this is lacking funding at a time when there are more and more calls upon its services.

This year marks the *centenary of the ending of the "war to end all wars"* so the Council will be discussing ways to celebrate this momentous anniversary, there should be a beacon lighting and maybe even a party! More information will be given out nearer the time, when details have been finalised.

West Devon Borough Council have to pay for every "black bag" which goes into a landfill site. The estimated cost to the Council this year is well over £240,000.

Devon County Council call to carers -Let us know who you are!

If you look after someone else on a voluntary basis, then there's information and support available that may help you.

Carers looking after husbands, wives, family members, vulnerable children, neighbours and friends without payment account for most of the 'care and support' that keeps thousands of people in Devon independent.

Carers, generally speaking, are heads down, sleeves rolled up kind of people, getting on with the task in hand. Many don't consider themselves to be 'carers', they're just doing what needs to be done, and many do not seek support which means right now they're missing out on help available to them.

There are an estimated 90,000 people providing unpaid care for loved ones and friends in Devon, but only 20,000 known to the County's carers' support services.

Devon County Council, with partners NEW Devon CCG and South Devon and Torbay CCG is announcing a new carers support service. Carers support services are becoming more targeted and more specialised.

We've been asking carers what sort of support they feel would be helpful, and making improvements to services we provide to carers as as result.

One of our big challenges though is in reaching carers. We're in touch with many, but there are many more who we don't yet know and can't yet support.

An UPDATE

In late 2015 the Peter Tavy Community Hydropower (PTCH) committee obtained a £20,000 grant from WRAP to implement a feasibility study for a hydropower scheme running from the Colley Brook and ending in the village.

WRAP is an independent organization that administers government funding for the purposes of realizing rural community energy schemes.

The feasibility study on the Peter Tavy Hydropower scheme was finished last year with the aim of determining the financial and environmental feasibility of such a scheme, based on funding from a community share offer.

The study showed that a hydropower scheme could deliver over 400,000 kilowatt hours of electricity per year, equivalent to use by over 100 households. The scheme capital costs would be in the order of \pounds 450,000 to \pounds 500,000 and the income from the generated electricity would be over \pounds 50,000 per year.

Whilst these figures are impressive, currently the best financial models we have suggest that this rate of return makes the scheme borderline viable. We do not consider it possible to make an attractive community share offer and meaningful community financial benefit without an unacceptable degree of risk. Whilst the scheme is viable if every year's rainfall is average, a couple of drier winters would put the scheme income in peril. This state of affairs has arisen principally because the government cut hydropower tariffs by around two-thirds a couple of years ago.

Whilst the scheme is, therefore, in a state of dormancy, this may only be temporary. A small change in income received for the power we generated would re-activate it as a robust and viable entity. One way this might happen is if we were able to sell cheap electricity to you via a local energy market. Other ways of increasing the price we get for our energy will be investigated by PTCH committee members over the coming months.

Last year, with a Parish Council member and a village member, we visited the Huckworthy hydropower scheme to see how they have dealt with the potentially aggravating issue of noise generated by the turbine. The scheme is similar in size to the proposed scheme, and with proper design and sound insulation they have reduced the sound essentially to zero even standing outside the turbine shed.

And that's how he comes to be packing, at this very minute, to drive all the way here from Up Country to entertain and inform us. I'm looking forward to it tremendously.

Patrick's A PERAMBULATIONS

I am sure I do not need to tell you that my Perambulations are presently suspended! Only dog-owners and those impervious to cold winds, rain and sodden ground, dangerously slippery and muddy, would venture forth on Dartmoor. In many ways I am happy to watch sporting events on TV, but regret the pain of getting out of a chair on to seized-up legs to lurch around the cottage.

I ended my last article with "Reflections" and, now, it seems appropriate to recall many happy hours of walking and letter-boxing if only to satisfy my earnest wish that, with drier and warmer weather, I shall once again stretch my legs on the moor.

Angela and I have enjoyed many 'firsts' walking into the unknown. Our stamp collection is a proof of our visits, over twenty years, to places we had spotted on the OS map and/or read about in Crossing's Guide, Hemery's High Moor, Worth's Dartmoor, Rowe's Perambulations, and Hayward's Dartmoor 365. All these authors, together with contributors to Dartmoor Magazine and Dartmoor News have whet our appetites to see moorland features, visit antiquities and accept challenges, which we might never have considered worth the effort involved.

I think the outstanding memory will always be our first visit to Fur Tor - "Queen of the Moor" - on 23rd June 2002. We had started out early from Baggator Tor Gate with the intention of looking for letterboxes in Tavy Hole (later to become a favourite spot where we scattered the ashes of my two cross border collies) and following the Tavy up to its Head. It was a glorious summer's day and we collected the stamps of 12 boxes en route. Looking North from South Tavy Head (as it is marked on the map), we realised that Vur Tor was not that far away. What an irresistible temptation!. We decided then and there to take the longer way back to Baggator. I wrote in the November 2002 edition of *The Peter Tavy Piper*:

"It was just after 6 o'clock on a hot sunny evening when we reached the imposing stack of block granite and, of course, immediately wondered how we could have resisted the challenge for so long! The views are superb, a sense of isolation and peace prevails and, naturally, the long tiring walk is quickly forgotten".

I must confess now that in those days we always took small bottles of wine with us. I remember opening them to celebrate our achievement! Our next visit was just a month later when we spent a day exploring the tor and collecting a further dozen stamps.

Today, as I type, I hope we shall be able to pay another visit, taking a more direct route in favourable weather, to visit another 15 boxes in the proximity of this iconic tor. *- Patrick Cashell*

Concentrate... And discover How the Date of Easter is Calculated

The ancient Egyptians and Hebrews used different calendars. The Egyptian calendar was based on the movement of the sun, and this passed down via the Romans to become the modern world's standard. The Jewish calendar is based on the phases of the moon – as is the Islamic calendar, which is why the month of Ramadan takes places at different times each year, as Muslims wait for sightings of the moon before they know what day it will begin.

Easter is one of the festivals which tries to harmonise the solar and lunar calendars. As a general rule, Easter falls on the first Sunday, following the first full moon after 21 March. But not always.

According to the gospels Jesus was killed three days before the Resurrection, around the time of the Jewish Passover. So Christians wanted to have their feast day around the same time as the Jewish festival, which was fixed by the first full moon (called the "Paschal Full Moon") following the Vernal equinox, (also known as the "March equinox" - the spring day when night and day are the same length).

But an *astronomical* full moon, like an astronomical equinox, is not a day but a moment in time – which can be observed happening on different days either side of the international date line. So the church fathers decided that the Paschal Full Moon (PFM) would not be an *astronomical* moon but an *ecclesiastical* full moon. These could be set down ahead of time, which is what happened from 325 AD. Astronomers approximated astronomical full moon dates for the church, calling them Ecclesiastical Full Moon (EFM) dates. Thus Easter was defined as the Sunday after the first EFM after 20th March - the date appointed as the vernal equinox, regardless of whether it was or not. So this provided a calculated full moon following a specified equinox.

Many methods have been used since early Christian times to work out the date of Easter Day. It was made more complicated in 1582 when Pope Gregory XIII replaced the old Roman 'Julian' calendar (started by Julius Caesar) with a new more accurate 'Gregorian' calendar, which most people still use today. In the UK, Easter was first calculated using the Gregorian calendar in 1753 when the country had changed calendars.

Catholic and western Christians now use the Gregorian calendar to find the date of Easter. However, some Orthodox churches still use the old Julian Calendar and celebrate Easter on a different day (the Julian Calendar is now 13 days behind the Gregorian calendar) and also use a different full moon to calculate from.

In our Gregorian Calendar, Easter can be on a date from March 22nd to April 25th.

Both governments and churches have tried to introduce a fixed date for Easter, but without success. In Britain, an Easter Act was passed in 1928 fixing the holiday as "the first Sunday after the second Saturday in April". The law remains on the statute book but has never been enforced. There are too many contradictory influences brought to bear.

It seems that Easter is set to remain the original moveable feast.

The Devon Home Library Service


A couple of snippets from the "Tavistock Times" of over 90 years ago, reflecting how village life has changed here beyond recognition. (...*Errr*.....?)
