



Mrs Rattenbury's Carrot Cake

Bring along your cake on the morning of the Fayre by 11.30am, with your entry fee of 50p. Please indicate if you are happy for your cake to be sold after the judging.

Ingredients:

3 oz. caster sugar
3 eggs
8 oz. self-raising flour
Pinch of salt
1 teaspoon of cinnamon
3 oz. currants

1 teaspoon of vanilla essence 7 fluid oz. Sunflower oil

2 oz. chopped nuts (optional)

For the topping:

200 grams of Philadelphia Cheese 400 grams icing sugar (sifted) Lemon juice or 1 tsp. vanilla essence. 2 oz. chopped walnuts (optional)

Method:

Whisk eggs and sugar slowly, add oil and whisk again. Fold in currants, carrots, nuts (if desired); followed by flour, cinnamon and vanilla essence. Turn into a 2lb loaf tin.

Bake in oven at 180° C (350° F; Gas Mark 4) for $1\frac{1}{4}$ to $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours, or until firm to the touch.

When cold, ice as follows: Combine 200 grams of Philadelphia Cheese with 400 grams of sifted icing sugar, add few drops of lemon juice or 1 teaspoon of vanilla essence - mix until very smooth. Spread over top of cake. If wished, press 2 oz. of chopped walnuts into the topping.

The Plod is a 5-mile run starting from the Peter Tavy cross and returning via a loop on moorland tracks and trails. Entry is £8.


The Fun Run is a 1 mile multi-terrain loop costing $\pounds 3$ to enter.

Peter Tavy Combe

Patrick Cashell reports how writers of the past viewed our Combe.

(Left - the Combe in 1908)

It was at the funeral of Brenda Williams in the Chapel on 16th December 2021, when her poem, entitled "*The Coombe*" (sic) was read, that I realised just what we have on our doorstep which is part of our heritage - Peter Tavy Combe. Respected writers of Dartmoor literature described it in the past.

William Crossing wrote in his *Guide to Dartmoor* (Published 1912):

"Peter Tavy Combe is situated to the South of Smearn Down. We cross the road below Boulter's Tor, and in a corner of the common we come upon a footpath running through some enclosures. Turning right we follow it for a short distance, when we shall find ourselves on the North side of the Combe, just above Little Combe Tor. Great Combe Tor rises on the other side of this little valley, and beyond

it is Cocks' Tor Hill. The tor seen between the two is locally known as Sharp Tor. Peter Tavy Combe is a charming spot, to which clings more than one story of the pixies. Peter Tavy Brook runs through it, and is crossed near the lower end of the Combe by a clam."

The Revd. S Baring Gould in his book *A Book on Dartmoor* (1900) wrote: "Peter Tavy Combe must on no account be neglected; it is a remarkably picturesque valley".

Eric Hemery in *High Dartmoor* (1983) wrote: "Peter Tavy Combe is a border glen of great beauty".

Brenda's poem encapsulates the feelings of these three authors and offers a sanctuary of peace and reflection to parishioners and visitors. How lucky we are to be able to enjoy it in times of need.

The Coombe

The Coombe is a beautiful place - I go there for peace and solace. It works special magic for me, And never charges me a fee.

I played there when I was a child,
Happy and free and wild.
There's lots of bird and animals there They frolic and play without a care.
I sit and watch as life goes by,
Sometimes with a laugh, sometimes
with a cry.

My favourite place helps me to cope In this mad world of work, drink and dope. If everyone could have a place like this, Perhaps they too could find this bliss - The bliss of being content with life. No more arguments with the kids and wife. The Coombe is perhaps a state of mind - And something I hope all can find.

A Pen & Ink Affair

After having not written anything much, apart from my diary, for nearly two years I thought it would be a bit difficult to come up with anything worth consideration by the Piper.

However, I remembered that Edna O'Brien, the celebrated Irish novelist, didn't write anything for a whole decade in her career. That wasn't to do with a global pandemic though, it was more to do with her early books being a bit edgy for the times and

they tried to ban them and even burnt them in public. Nevertheless she was still given the Irish Golden Pen award, which just goes to show that there's no such thing as bad publicity in the Arts world.

Actually my first pen - a Burnham Junior - was a sort of golden pen because it had 5 carets in the nib, which was a big deal when you're seven. I remember it quite well but recall that it did result in regular blottings of my copybook, filling it was quite an art. It was all pen and ink back then, and everyone had to learn to use a nib. In the desks of the time there were ink wells to dip the school pens into, and it could of course all prove to be a bit messy. No doubt the old wooden floor down the village school got well stained even under the watchful eye of Miss Hoskins - perish the thought that such might happen today in the newly refurbished village hall!

The introduction of the Platignum cartridge pen in 1965 was a great step forward for school work, no more bottles of Quink to have spilling around in your satchel, all a lot better. A bit like grease cartridges for lubing farm machinery. Later on, I had a Sheaffer (American) from Wilcocks in West street, it was a beauty. My current pen is a Lamy (German), and is everything it's cracked up to be, and was kindly given to me by my accountant friend and fellow pen enthusiast whose preference was for a vintage Osmiroid.

The most memorable pen I have used was on the sad occasion of going up to the Kilworthy council offices to register the death of my father. The Registrar produced a pen from his jacket pocket - nothing special to look at, but was so perfect to write a signature with, so 'suent', and in green ink which he explained would never fade.

Given that biros are so commonplace these days, you wouldn't think people still get a bit precious about their own pens. This was born out one day some years ago when I went into a local solicitor's office to sign a document. On handing me his Parker he said 'do mind the nib', fearing that his banana-fingered client would exert ball point pressure and harm his beloved.

Pens have certainly come a long way from the days of the quill and the requisite penknife to trim it - but when you consider the new touchy-wipey technology and

signing on a screen for a delivery with your finger nail, you do wonder whether we have advanced at all from the days of just 'making your mark' on paper!

Getting back to Edna though, I don't know what pen she's got but at 92 I hope she's continuing her long-running affair with it, and still giving her readers something to think about.

As for me I also hope that no-one in Peter Tavy is moved to burn their copy of the Piper on account of what I've written. If pressed I'd have to feign a memory lapse of the dictum regularly issued by Mr D S Charleston, the renowned Geography master at Tavistock Comprehensive school in the 60s:

"Think before you ink."

Patrick's PERAMBULATIONS

Patrick Cashell offers us the chance to enjoy some perambulations of our own...

With considerable regret, I am afraid, physically, my Dartrmoor walking days are over, but I'd like to offer readers some of the Walks which Angela and I enjoyed over the years. There are, of course, a great many books available to walkers on Dartmoor and I do not intend to suggest that my routes are the best.

From whatever source you select your walk, do not forget to wear, or carry with you, suitable, comfortable clothes, preferably waterproof, and good strong boots. Prepare your route in advance on Ordnance Survey Explorer Map OL28 and carry with you a whistle, a compass and, if possible, a GPS, first aid kit, food and water/energising drink.

Walk 1. From the Fox & Hounds PH, Lydford. (SX 5253 8669).

If you start early, park at the end of the lane at Nodden Gate (SX 5300 8631); through the gate join the clear track NW passing below the western flank of Great Nodden and above the King Wall.

At Points, (SX 5465 8875), where trucks on the east part of the Tramway changed on to the north-west track, continue east, passing over Lydda Bridge, leaving Gren Tor on your left and Great Links Tor on your right. Soon after the cutting, look for a path, right, which leads to Higher Dunnagoat Tor, Lower Dunnagoat Tor and the Peat Cutters' track from Bleak House - which you join going west.

Look out for a Lydford (L) Boundary Stone, below which, on your left, is Dick's Well (SX 5512 8605). Continue west on the track, noting Arms Tor on your right, until you reach the River Lyd, before taking a path north along its bank as far as the end of a wall, where there is a ford and track uphill back to Nodden Gate.

I hope you enjoyed this walk! Drive back down the track to The Fox & Hounds for a pint - Cheers! - Patrick Cashell.
