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Very special occasions like this are an opportunity for our whole community to come together to mark the event, and share fun and friendship with friends and neighbours.

We held a first planning meeting for the Coronation weekend back on 1st March, where lots of ideas were suggested. There's a second meeting on Wednesday 29th March at 7.30pm in the Village Hall - hope you can come along and join us! Our initial ideas and plans - yet to be finalised! - include:

In advance of the weekend, we'll be putting up bunting around the village, and you could join in the "DECORATE YOUR HOME FOR THE CORONATION" competition - adorn your gate or house with flags or flowers. There's also a "DESIGN AND MAKE A CROWN" competition - age categories: 5 & under; 11 &under; 16 & under - and over 16s. The crowns will be put on display in the church.

Saturday 6th May - Coronation Day. King Charles III and Queen Consort Camilla leave Buckingham Palace in the 'King's Procession' for the Coronation service in Westminster Abbey in the morning. After the service they return to Buckingham Palace in the larger 'Coronation Procession'. We thought that many people may prefer to stay at home to watch the pageantry on TV with families and friends - so our Peter Tavy activities would start on...

Sunday 7th May A special "SONGS OF PRAISE" service at 11.00am in St Peter's church, held jointly with Peter Tavy Methodist Church. Everyone is invited to suggest their favourite hymn for the service - we'll fit in as many as possible! This will be followed by Peter Tavy's own "BIG LUNCH" (they're being held across the country) in the Methodist Chapel - a "Bring and Share" meal together -

The big "Coronation Concert" will be taking place at Windsor Castle later in the day - again it will be televised... and we do have a big screen, projector and wifi in the Village Hall...

wear your own crown if you'd like!

Monday 8th May (Coronation Bank Holiday): nationally today has been designated "THE BIG HELP OUT", encouraging people around the country to volunteer and work to support their local areas. Our current idea is that, at 10.00am, we should all make our way up to the Coombe Pool together, and work to tidy and improve the surrounding area... But plans may change!

After a day of working together, we would return to the Village Hall to share a **BARBECUE** together, starting at around 5.00pm

There are many other ideas to be added to the mix - maybe a walk around the parish, a dance, games, and more... Watch out for more details of how you can join in as the weekend approaches.

REPORT from Your PARISH COUNCIL

It has been a busy few months for the Parish Council since the last edition of '*The Peter Tavy Piper'*, and spring is now here - so hopefully we will all have some lovely sunshine to enjoy soon.

The Millpond has had essential repairs to the back wall, getting ready for the better weather.

Both the Church Cottages have tenants in place, and a programme of ongoing maintenance is being steadily worked through. These Cottages really are vital assets to this Village, with many neighbouring Parishes without any such affordable housing.

The Playing Field project is now taking priority with dangerous decaying older items being demolished and replaced with longer lasting modern play equipment. The Parish Council hope to get this next phase finished before the summer holidays. There has been a lot of hard work on the funding applications behind the scenes to get this next phase underway.

The Chairman of the Parish Council has had a face-to-face meeting with the new Neighbourhood Highways Officer to point out problems with our road network, and although budget constraints mean there could be no commitment as to when these works will start, it was a pleasant change that somebody was listening to our concerns. One of the most important issues is the junction with the main A386, which as we all know is like running the gauntlet at times, waiting to turn back into Peter Tavy from the Tavistock direction. The County Council will not entertain even looking at the problems with this junction until they have had actual reports of near misses and accidents at this particular accident black-spot. With this in mind if you should be involved in or witness a near miss here could you please let the Clerk know so I can report it directly to Highways, then hopefully if we get enough reports they will in turn take a look at what can be done to make this junction safer for all.

Plans to celebrate the upcoming Coronation of King Charles III are being made (see opposite) and the long weekend in May should be one to remember.

Finally ARE YOU HAPPY WITH YOUR PARISH COUNCIL and what they all do on behalf of your Parish? Now is your chance to have your say in the upcoming local elections of May 4th. If you or anybody you know would be interested in becoming a Parish Councillor, or you think would make a good Parish Councillor, please let The Clerk know. Nominations need to be submitted to West Devon Borough Council by 4th April. If you can come along on 4th May and vote for your chosen Parish Councillors, it can only be a good thing to know that you had a say in who was democratically elected. The Parish Councillors, after all, give up their time to attend monthly meetings and work on your behalf to keep this Parish the unspoilt place we love to live in.

LOCAL ELECTIONS

On Thursday 4th May 2023, local elections are taking place across West Devon. At these elections, you will need to bring photo ID to be able to vote at a polling station.

Acceptable forms of Photo ID include:

- ✓a passport
- ✓a photographic driving licence
- ✓a Blue Badge
- ✓an Older Person's Bus Pass
- ✓a Disabled Person's Bus Pass
- **✓**a Defence Identity Card
- ✓a Biometric Immigration Document
- ✓a PASS card (an identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram)

Postal voting is not affected by the new requirements.

You can use your photo ID

if it's out of date,

as long as the

photo still looks like you.

Remembering Coronations Past...

As plans are laid to mark the Coronation this year, we're looking back at the memories of those who celebrated the coronation of HM Queen Elizabeth II, 70 years ago in 1953.

John Collins recalls...

"I was a boy of 9 years of age, and I recall there were sports held for children and adults in the field below the Reading Room (now Laurel House). I took part in the sports and we were presented with mugs afterwards.

Mrs W. Bailey, who ran the village shop with her husband, had a stall in the field with refreshments and I particularly remember having an ice cream soda.

The Reverend Pratt, the rector of Peter Tavy, made a speech over the sports club PA. The bells were rung. There were also refreshments available in the school, as it was then - now the Village Hall.

I seem to remember there was a radio in the school broadcasting the Coronation - there was little or no television in the village at that time as reception was very poor as Hessary Tor mast was not yet completed.

That evening there was a dance, held in the school, which my older sister, Julia, went to. My mother made her a dirndl skirt to wear to it.

That same evening I can remember going up to Smeardon Down to see the beacon fire. In the days leading up to the fire being lit, my brother, Graham, and I helped my father take up faggots of wood on my father's tractor and trailer."

PETER TAVY BELLS RING ALL DAY

Peter Tavy Parish Church bells were rung from early morning till well into the night and a united service, conducted by Rev. B. C. C. Pratt, rector, was largely attended.

A sports programme and a tea followed, and later there was a social in the schoolroom.

A bonfire with over 1,000 faggots was lit on Smerdon Down by Mr. S. Gendle and Mr. A. R. Bellamy.

Report in the 'Western Morning News' of June 3rd 1953. Don't panic - no plans to ring all day this time... But do listen out for the bells on Coronation morning!

• Marjorie Sherrell (née Vogwill) was living with her parents at Hillside, Langsford at the time. She remembers that her cousin June Arscott's family, who lived next door, got their first TV set for the Coronation, and all her family went round to their house to watch the ground-breaking live broadcast.

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• Bill Lane, then a junior lieutenant, was in charge of the hospitality tents as the 16th Parachute Batallion were Beating the Retreat at Moascar Stadium (right) on coronation day - in the then-occupied Suez Zone in Egypt.

He recalls... "My main recollection was that during the playing of 'Sunset' (the evening hymn), we were instructed to take the wire off the bottles of champagne.



"The organisers had failed to work out that although the bottles were kept in large wash tubs of ice, due to the Middle Eastern heat the corks were likely to pop. The playing of 'Sunset' then sounded much more like the '1812 Overture'!"

- Phyllis Dodd (late of Chubb Farm) told us that she was asked to help out with the Coronation celebration tea. She had to make sponge cakes but not in the traditional round tin: this was in a rectangular swiss roll tin. So the finished sponge was topped with red, white and blue icing and cut into little 'fancies' to ensure that everyone got a bit of red, white and blue icing!
- The year after the Coronation, *Peter Tinson* was a national serviceman on a troop ship headed to the Suez Zone in Egypt. In the Mediterranean, his ship crossed with the Royal Yacht *Britannia* carrying the Queen homewards from her Coronation tour. The troopship captain hoped to close with the *Britannia* to allow the servicemen to parade on deck for their new Queen. But the Royal Navy Mediterranean fleet escorting the *Britannia* had other ideas, keeping the troopship at a distance. Peter and his fellow servicemen could only snap the *Britannia* passing by on the horizon!



Looking further back...



We haven't found any photos of the 1953 Coronation celebrations in Peter Tavy - but this one shows the gate to the Village Hall (then the School) decorated for the 1937 Coronation of George VI.



The Lime trees which used to surround St Peter's Church may have been planted in 1760 on the coronation of George III.



Much has happened since the last Piper. Christmas has come and long gone - but we have happy memories of carol singing in the village hall yard, the Nativity play, carol services and Christmas bell ringing. Much fun was had by all at Messy Church in January and

Linhays, Lintels & Lunkeys

- Tom Roskilly ponders

Anyone who casts their mind back to February 2022 will remember that 'furious winter's rages' and in particular Storm Eunice which blew in with gusto on the morning of Friday 18th, leaving a trail of havoc in its wake. Out at Willsworthy brook bridge, a tree fell down and blocked the road, but thanks to the sterling efforts of Tim Dodd, who was working in the area, it was soon cleared for residents to go on with their busy lives. At Lower Nutley, Janet heard an almighty bang whilst in the sheep shed, and looked out to find the roof of an old shed in the lower field completely gone and deposited in the field above the cottage. The shed, which we have always referred to as 'The Abbot's Linnie', had been useful as a nursery for ewes with young lambs, but alas no more.

Scrolling on to May, Steve Allen - an old Tavistock School friend - and his wife Kim were spending a short break in the vicinity and dropped in to see us. He is an actor by trade, with an interest in all things local and historical and so we took them over the lane to see the old building in its damaged state. After doing a little research he told us that our building had most likely been an old *Linhay*, where cattle were sheltered and fed below a sort of loft where hay was stored. The loft area had long gone, and the gaps between the unique round pillars have been stoned in for ages, but nevertheless it has all the features of this type of farm building really only found here in the South West. Suffice it to say that, thanks to a local builder well-versed in the concept of restoration, the *Linhay* has now acquired a new roof, not only to protect its rather special architecture, but also to give it a new lease of life for sheep-husbandry.

Across the lane, Lower Nutley – aka Old Nutley – is very old as well, and whilst

'our' builder was about, he also replaced a couple of decaying *Lintels* above the frontfacing windows. Now, whereas most people will know what a *Lintel* is, they might not know what a Lunkey is. To tell the truth, I only came across one when I listened to an episode of *The Archers* some years ago, when a chap appeared on the scene at Ambridge to build it. A *Lunkev* is essentially a dedicated passage through a stone wall or bank for animals to travel through. You see them around here in several hedge banks. often stock-wired up now because they're no longer appropriate, much like the stone styles which post-boys used years ago to take the shortest route between distant houses in the parish.

How does all this fit together? Well, Steve played the chap in the storyline who made a masterful job of constructing the *Lunkey*. Quite clever people, these actors! Oh, and by the way, in 1991 he 'stormed' through and won Mastermind with his knowledge of Sir Francis Drake and the Armada of 1588.

From what I remember the Spaniards ran into a bit of bad weather as well when they were on the way home that April and it didn't end well for them.

So, notwithstanding climate change, one thing's for sure: if you're thinking about more sheep housing, or even crossing the Channel, you can't go by the weather in the previous year....

Sal's journey over the last couple of years has been hard, humbling and heart-breaking to observe. Physical demands and mental struggles after a brain injury are huge. Re-learning simple life skills is enormous, progress slow and the mental willpower required as the brain tries to adapt is simply immense.

The best I can do is continue to be her "bestie" and help those who can help her, and others like her. The Stroke Association provides specialist support, research and campaigning which

St. PETER's CHURCH NEW



Alongside our regular Sunday morning communion services, we've enjoyed welcoming so many to special services, including last October's Harvest Festival (which raised £660, split equally between the Shelterbox, Sightsavers and Farm Community Network charities) and our Christmas Eve "midnight communion" service,

Christmas morning service and service of Nine Lessons and Carols.

Many thanks to all those who came along to our Church and churchyard cleaning and clearing day last September - there's another one coming up on 17th June, when we plan to make the church look its best for wedding services there later in the year.

By the time this Piper reaches you, we will have enjoyed a Coffee Morning at Janet Bedford's wonderful home, Manor Farm House in Cudlipptown. It's always a welcoming gathering of friends and neighbours, raising funds for St Peter's - thank you, Janet! There's another opportunity for a get-together at our annual Strawberry Tea in the village hall at 4.00pm on 10th June.

Since the last "Piper" there has been a lot of work going on at St Peter's, re-wiring the building and starting to address the problem of our "wet tower". In September last year, scaffolding was installed inside the tower and the cement render was removed from the inside walls of the ground-floor ringing chamber, allowing them to "breathe" again. The timber floor and beams above the ringing chamber were replaced while scaffolding was in place. Externally, cement pointing was removed from the lower courses of the stonework. Dowels have been inserted into the thick walls of the tower to monitor and trace the damp within. Now phase 1 of the project has been completed. New cupboards and wooden trunking have been installed around the electrical works, and some work has also been undertaken on drainage and guttering. Phase 2 of the work on the tower will be starting soon, and repairs made to the tower roof. The PCC (Parochial Church Council) are very grateful to Anya Yeatman for her work in leading these projects forward.

The PCC have been continuing to consider the church finances. Alongside regular outgoings, we have faced major expenditure on the tower and electrical works. (We are grateful for the grant of £3,000 received from the Devon Historic Churches Trust to help towards our costs.) We are also looking at the future position of St Peter's within the Tavistock Deanery and have held an initial meeting with the new Vicar of Tavistock, Rev'd Matthew Godfrey.

Peter Tavy COMMON - A Commoner's Perspective

It is with great sadness and a troubled mind that I am writing this.

20 years ago, Natural England (NE) brought a potential agreement to Peter Tavy Commoners, suggesting working together to improve the Common. They believed that the Common was over-grazed and in poor condition. NE had been doing the same thing across the country with other common associations.

This was a voluntary agreement for Peter Tavy Commoners, under which we could reduce the levels of livestock on the Common, or sign into an agreement with NE to reduce stock slightly further, and receive a payment for following the restrictions they had set out for 10 years, to enable the Common to improve.

The rules included removing cattle from the Common each year from November to March. This resulted in planning permissions being sought for cattle sheds to house the once-hardy cattle when they were brought down from the moor in these months. We Peter Tavy Commoners were never really sure what improvements NE hoped to see, but it was reluctantly agreed to take a harder cut in stock levels and receive a payment for delivering public benefits. So for 10 years our 32 Commons right-holders, the majority of them not being graziers, have been suspicious of one another, all constantly seeking that last extra blade of grass.

The agreement ended in 2012, and yet although the Common had changed, it was deemed not to have improved as much as NE wanted. The SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest) was looking favourable, as were a few other areas. Therefore, another agreement was offered. It was agreed to maintain that same stocking level then, as improvements were coming.

But in 2017, following a survey by NE, they found it vital to reduce winter sheep levels. After tough negotiation the Commoners managed to get NE to agree to a 45% reduction of sheep grazed on the Common between October and March, (this was a lower reduction than NE had wanted). But what exactly are we to do with a hardy hill sheep for all those months it is off the Common?

Fast forward to 2021/22, and another survey still does not find what NE require. Meanwhile gorse is taking a strong hold on Cudlipptown Down, no lapwings and no livestock have been seen for years, and Molinia is rampant (*Molinia caerula* - or Purple moor grass - can form dense tussocks covering large upland areas. Without management it can dominate other grassland species resulting in a monoculture - to the detriment of grazing and key species of wildlife). Only walkers' feet and dogs remain!

The agreement ends in September this year. To extend it, graziers would have to take *all* sheep off the Common in winter, and cattle and ponies must make up 50% of summer grazing.

It's a hill farmer's nightmare. There seems to be a total lack of understanding by those making the rules. The rules are generic across England, so there is no consideration of the local climate and environment particular to Peter Tavy Common. Beyond losing the hefted* stock that has taken generations to build up into hardy, disease-free flocks and herds, the restrictions take away the skills and traditions that are needed to farm the hills. The next generation of farmers will not have their parents' example to learn from. Likewise the dogs, the shepherd's faithful work companions, need different skills to work up on the Common than they do in lowland "bye work".

The Commoners work the Common as an extension to their farms. Grandfathers registered Commoners' rights though the land they owned, and these rights are passed on when land changes hands. The majority of farmers have grown up respecting and enjoying commoning; its more than a way of life and it certainly isn't a 9-5 job!

The majority of graziers do not want to feel dictated to any longer. But in providing public benefits - like clean water; access to archaeology; space for walking and enjoyment, and training grounds for the MoD, to name but a few - alongside biodiversity, they should be recompensed. It seems to have been forgotten that the improvements in the landscape and environment that have been seen occurred alongside our continuing management of a variety of livestock on the Commons. I thought you might be interested to know what is happening to the Common of Peter Tavy - all 1,018 hectares of it - and what will be filling the Commoners' Association's time over the coming months.

(*For those who aren't sure, "hefting" is the traditional way of managing livestock on large open areas of communal upland grazing, like common land. Over time, the animals have learnt their 'heft' and do not need to be shepherded to stay in particular area. This knowledge is passed from ewe to lamb each generation. The stock learn where good grazing and shelter can be found at different times of year.)

Thank you, Patrick!

It is with great sadness that we say farewell to Patrick Cashell, who passed away on Monday 6th March.

Piper readers will know that Patrick has been a regular contributor since February 1998. For 24 years his writings have featured in every issue. From May 2000, no edition was complete without his accounts of walks on the moor - "Patrick's Perambulations" - and the intriguing puzzles of his "Competition Corner", for which he also provided the prizes. In addition, he also helped with distribution of the *Piper* to households in the village.

During the years since he moved to the village in "Beating of the Bounds" 1997, Patrick served on the Village Hall Committee; on St Peter's Church PCC (Parochial Church Council) and, for a time, on the Parish Council. He founded the Peter Tavy Scottish Country Dance Group, and instituted the biennial Peter Tavy Dartmoor Evenings. These regularly included Donna Baker's Peter Tavy-based comedy playlets, in which Patrick took on roles including an escaped Dartmoor Prison convict; a second world war German pilot who had crashed on Smeardon... and even 'Lord Caster' (Peter Tavy's version of Lord Sugar in its own episode of "The Apprentice"). He also shared his love of walking on the Moors, organising and leading walks - including the "Perambulation of the Forest of Dartmoor" - and helping to lead the Beating of the Parish Bounds.

Thank you, Patrick, for all you did and for all your contributions to the *Peter Tavy Piper* - we will surely miss them!

Extra COVID-19 booster vaccine this spring for those at highest risk

Devon County Council is warning that COVID-19 continues to infect thousands of people every week - and advises that those at highest risk of severe illness should top up their immunity ahead of the planned autumn booster programme.

An extra COVID-19 booster vaccine dose in spring 2023 is to be offered to:

- adults aged 75 years old and over
- residents in a care home for older adults
- people aged 5 to 74 years old with a weakened immune system

DCC explains that the vaccine offers the best protection against the virus and helps to reduce the risk of becoming seriously ill or hospitalised. Immunity wanes over time so it is important to top it up by getting a booster if you are eligible.

Please wait to be contacted by the NHS if you believe you are eligible as they will let you know when you can be offered the booster.

Why is a Pothole called a Pothole?

Some brief online research suggests that... no-one is really sure. One intriguing idea is that during Roman times, potters found an easy source of raw material by digging up the roads to reach clay underneath. People trying to use the roads later knew what the potters had been up to, and called the resulting ruts "potholes".

Alternatively, if the word is split into two parts, in Middle English the word "pot" or "potte" meant "a deep hole", often for mining or peat-digging. Today "pot" can also mean something cylindrical in shape - a good description of a "pothole".

Or how about the simple idea that a "pothole" meant a hole or recess on the top of a stove into which you can place a pot?

The use of "pothole" in caving terms is seen as far back as 1809, and by 1811 it was in use to describe the awkward ruts and holes in a road surface. In the 1820s, geologists in America described the cylindrical holes in river rock beds as "potholes". The Archbald Pothole in Pennsylvania is one you'd really want to avoid, being 38ft (11.5m) deep and 42ft (12.8m) across!

Today the word is often also used as a metaphor for problems or difficulties encountered. It seems fair to say that in trying find the origin of the word "pothole", we have found a series of potholes in our way!



A high-moisture atmosphere creates a growing medium on every surface, so 'life grows upon life'. The woodlands have a sense of mystery; the air can be thick with mist, enigmatic fungi work their magic, and the exquisite colours and textures of mosses, ferns and lichens cloak the trees. Our temperate rainforests' bryophyte (moss and liverwort) richness is said to rival the cloud forest of the Andes. Explore our rainforest, but tread gently to preserve it for generations to come.
