

REPORT from Your PARISH GOUNGIL

Your Parish Councillors are Chairman David Chanter, Vice Chairman Jim Jeffery, Amanda Barton, Ruth Myott, Ken Ball and Edward Dodd – they are all very approachable and do not bite, so feel free to ask them about local issues affecting your Parish.

There is a **vacancy** on your Parish Council - if you would be interested in joining us then please let the Clerk or one of our Councillors know asap. Don't be shy - your Parish needs you.





New **Playing Field equipment** has now been installed and is regularly being used by a large age range of local and visiting children. This new equipment is a great asset to the village and really enhances the Playing Field. The new equipment was made possible by grants from the National Lottery Communities Fund, West Devon Borough Council and $\pounds 10,000$ of funding directly from your Parish Council.



Would you like to see how **energy efficient** your property is and where it might be leaking the most heat from? The Parish Council will have the use of a thermal imaging system in the Autumn under loan from West Devon Borough Council – If you would be interested in using the camera please register your interest with the Clerk: petertavypc@hotmail.co.uk

Highways issues continue to be a constant concern within our Parish and the Parish Council regularly inform Devon County Council Highways of the issues. Unfortunately, communication from Highways is poor and budgetary constraints often mean that works are either not undertaken or completed to poor standards. The more people that report problems with our roads, drains, potholes etc



directly to Highways via their online portal on the Devon County Council website then the more likely that works will be carried out. Please report directly to them at 'Report a Problem - Roads and transport' (devon.gov.uk). Of course, your Parish Council will also continue to report these problems directly on your behalf.

During a recent meeting with our MP, Sir Geoffrey Cox KC, the Parish Council put forward questions regarding broadband and mobile coverage; issues with DCC Highways, and issues with the Land Registry – the meeting was well attended, and Sir Geoffrey listened to the concerns that the Parish Council put forward. At the time of writing there is no Dartmoor National Park Ranger responsible for our area. However the DNP are actively recruiting to fill this position asap and will let us know once a suitable new Ranger has been appointed.

The parish council recently commented on the **Devon Carbon Plan**; the plan is available on the DCC website. Our comments included a description of our parish in relation to carbon and covered the things the parish is already doing, plus future possibilities. To see our comments in full, or to be involved in working towards net zero here in Peter Tavy, please ask the clerk: petertavypc@hotmail.co.uk.

ELECTIONS and VOTER ID...

You now need Photo ID to yote at a Polling station you will need to bring photo ID to be able to vote



In brief, acceptable forms of Photo ID include: a passport; a photographic driving licence; a Blue Badge; an Older Person's Bus Pass; a Disabled Person's Bus Pass; a Defence Identity Card; a Biometric Immigration Document; a PASS card (an identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram)

NB: The name on your ID should be the same name you used to register to vote. You can use your photo ID if it's out of date, as long as the photo still looks like you. Postal voting is not affected by the new requirements.

Between 2001 and 2017, we enjoyed nine "Dartmoor Evenings" of traditional entertainment in the Village Hall. Organised by Patrick Cashell, and raising funds for the Hall and other charities, the events always concluded with a sketch or playlet. Here, **Donna Baker** looks back over...

Nine Years of *Dartmoor Evening* Drama

It was on a winter's evening in the Peter Tavy Inn (where so many great ideas have been born) when Patrick Cashell asked me if I would write a short sketch, based on the popular TV sitcom '*The Vicar of Dibley*', for the Bellringers to perform at an evening of entertainment he was organising in the Village Hall.

It was a simple idea - a parish council meeting, with rather familiar characters but using an event from Peter Tavy's history. After some thought, I remembered the famous escape from Dartmoor Prison of the so-called 'Mad Axeman' Frank Mitchell, a figure well known in Peter Tavy for drifting away from the working parties, calling in at the pub and even taking a bus into Tavistock for a little shopping!

My short sketch was set at an annual open parish council meeting, at which the prison governor was due to give a talk to parishioners. In fact, it was the escaped prisoner (never named) who entered, on a mission to settle scores with the pompous Chairman who, as magistrate, had been responsible for sending him to prison. You may sometimes still hear those of us who took part quote his first words, as he came in to find a large audience awaiting him: 'Oo are all these people?'

The council members, who had been told there had been an escape, quickly realised who he was, but the Chairman believed him to be the governor (dressed to impress in a suit of broad arrows, and carrying an axe), and refused to listen when they tried to tell him. When he finally realised, he turned to the other Council members and then to the audience for support, but he was not a popular man and was met instead with a barrage of recriminations and complaints. He was saved only by the arrival of the Governor himself, accompanied by a policeman, who took the now compliant prisoner quietly back to jail.

After the success of this short piece, it became tradition at the Dartmoor Evenings to end with a play, often based on parish council meetings (who remembers the entire cast wearing teddy bear ears for the meeting of a council several hundred years in the future?) and also on other TV sitcoms, such as 'Dad's Army' - our version was 'Grandad's Army' and involved women shutting the men out of the village hall while they made 'scrim' (camouflaged netting). They were interrupted by Steve Carr who dashed in shouting that 'there was something odd going on up at Smeardon - lights flashing and people rushing about', which turned out to be the crash of a German plane that really happened; some remains of it can still be found.

I tried as often as possible to include an event which either had happened, could have happened, or we rather wished might happen, in the village - such as the *Great Phone Mix-Up* which caused some consternation a few years ago.

It sometimes took a little stretch of the imagination. For instance, *Dr Who* has never actually visited the village (well, as far as we know....) but there have certainly been scarecrows seen around the village in August of several years, and is it really impossible that, with Peter Tavy *definitely* the centre of the universe, space aliens might well target the village in their attempt to take over? And who can have forgotten the Dalek, which had been standing quietly in a corner of the stage for the entire evening, suddenly coming to life, swooping amongst the entire cast and threatening to 'exterminate, exterminate' while David Dodd, wearing a long scarf, raced up the aisle shouting that he was on a mission and saving us all?

Patrick always took a leading role in these productions. As experts in the *Peter Tavy Antiques Road Show*, he and Roger Meyrick gave their opinions on items including a trombone, played by Jerry Morris until a dead rat fell out, and a musical box which had been used in the treacle mines of Pitt's Cleave to warn of fumes from the natural toffee seam (did I really write this stuff?!). And, as Lord Caster in our version of the *Peter Tavy Apprentice*, Patrick was suitably irascible about the disastrous attempts by Steve, Alan, Sue and Dick to make money from doing up old items of furniture, farm machinery and so on, most of which were better before they got their hands on them.

There were other sketches too, of varying situations associated - sometimes a little loosely - with Peter Tavy. They always came at the end of the *Dartmoor Evening* itself, an evening of Dartmoor song and dance - remember Philip Perry, Bill Murray, Geoff Hill, the readings from articles by Jan Stewer, and all those other wonderful local entertainers? - and each concluding sketch always ended with Angela coming on stage brandishing her huge teapot and loudly demanding: '*Does anyone want TAY*?'

Well, yes Angela, we would all like tea, please. We would like the chance to go back, just for one more time, to those wonderful Dartmoor Evenings which Patrick organised so well and so thoroughly. We would like to listen and laugh and cry a little, to chat and eat pasties and cakes during the interval, to enjoy the old songs, to forge again the friendships and memories that village entertainments bring.



We might even like to enter again the madness of the world that Patrick began when he first asked me to write a sketch based on a popular TV sitcom, which led me and the rest of us into realms we had never dreamed of.


But we would always like to end with TAY.....


Looks like Rain Again!


Her results may come as a bit of a shock, but they're certainly no real surprise! Many thanks to Nina for keeping us informed.

St. PETER's CHURCH NEWS

The bells rang out on Christmas morning and we were pleased to welcome so many to our services that morning and on Christmas Eve. Thanks to all who decorated the church for the season and made it look so beautiful for the festive season.

While the "Suspension of Presentation" (which delays the appointment of a rector for St Peter's and St Mary's, Mary Tavy) continues, Angela and Janet, our churchwardens, and the churchwarden from St Mary's, have met with the Archdeacon of Plymouth to discuss possible future arrangements for our two parishes. The future is still not settled, but we have recently received support for our regular church services through Tavistock church. On Palm Sunday, March 24th, the Vicar of Tavistock, Rev. Matt Godfrey, will be coming to St Peter's to join us in processing from the village Square up to St Peter's, where he will lead our service. Full details of Easter services are given on the back of this Piper; we hope to welcome many of you at these!

The St Peter's Church "Annual Parochial Church Meeting" will be held on Thursday 9th May at 7.00pm in the Village Hall, and all parishioners are welcome to join us. This year will also see the preparation of a new Church Electoral Roll; if you would like to join, please contact Angela Collins.

Maintenance and repair work has continued. Over the summer, the Tower fabric dried out, but the much wetter winter weather has seen the damp problems return. Further inspection, and remedial works - including repointing of problem areas and addressing the overflow of rainwater from the tower roof - are planned for later in the year. Meanwhile, wet rot in the skirting along the north aisle wall has been addressed by removing the woodwork and replacing it with suitable plastering. A new handrail has also been installed at the steps leading up to the churchyard upper gate, in memory of the Holmes family, whose descendant kindly financed the work.

Maintaining the fabric of our ancient church, central to the parish, is a costly undertaking, and we are grateful for contributions for this work received through regular monthly contributions from members of the "Friends of St Peter's" scheme. If you would like to join the "Friends" and help with the ongoing work, contact Bill Lane or Steve Balm for more details. You can also help with fundraising by donating your used ink cartridges for recycling - there's a box available at the back of the church.

Finally, we've been discussing another **Flower Festival** for the parish. In prepandemic years, a Festival had been held every four years, raising funds split, (like the Village Fayre), between Church, Chapel and Village Hall. The festivals featured themed floral displays in St Peter's, refreshments provided throughout the day in the Chapel, and a variety of parish history exhibitions. Unfortunately, there is not enough time to prepare for a festival this year, so we may look at trying to organise another in 2025 - with a difference, to mitigate the cost and environmental impact of using bought-in fresh flowers. Watch out for more information.



In November, screening of the 1969 film "Run Wild Run Free", (one scene filmed at the Peter Tavy Inn using several local residents as "extras"), was a very successful and popular event and had members of the audience trying to identify locals and the locations where the outdoor scenes were filmed.

So far we have identified... Left-hand photo - Harold Vogwill and Kate Stevens; Centre photo - L to R:(probably) Florrie Williams; Sir John Mills (not a local!); Bob Roberts (then the REAL landlord at the Inn); Right photo - Jack Jefferey (a.k.a. 'The Mayor of Peter Tavy'!). Locations spotted include Newton Abbot Market, Fox Tor Mire and Whiteworks (where, Dave Woodhouse tells us, Ernie Worth oversaw the excavation of the "bog" in which the white colt gets stuck); and Amanda Barton identified the location of "the Colonel's house" as Headland Warren Farm, west of Grimspound.

The Village Hall Christmas Fayre in late November was less well attended possibly due to the weather and the number of similar events nearby.

The pop-up restaurant "Let's Pig Out" in February was again extremely popular and well attended and a very enjoyable evening was had by all, helping to raise much needed funds for the hall. Thanks to all who worked so hard to make it a success.

Farewell to Peter Taxy's Mobile Library


