a performance from our own parish choir. Then we donned home-made crowns for our "Coronation Big Lunch" together in the Chapel, where young people of the parish received commemorative mugs from the Parish Council. The next day, (in less than favourable conditions!), many parishioners donned their waterproofs and made their way up to help clear out the Coombe pool for our "Coronation Big Help Out" project, after which a commemorative oak tree was planted up on Smeardon Down, and we returned to the Chapel to dry out over a Pasty lunch together. These Councillors all give up lots of their time without financial reward to represent you, the Parishioners. They are a very approachable group, so if you have any concerns about anything in the Parish, please speak to any of your Councillors or contact myself (the Clerk).

It has been a busy few months in the Parish calendar, with the Coronation of King Charles III being the first major event following the Elections in May. A native Oak tree was planted on Smeardon Down near to the seat and the other commemorative trees. Coronation mugs were presented to children in the Parish.

A major restoration of the Mill Pond has now been completed, and a huge thank you goes out to all the Councillors who took part in this and the clean up operation afterwards. It really is a fantastic asset to the Village and should now be enjoyed for many years to come.

The ongoing project of replacing old play equipment at the Playing Field is reaching its final stages. The old equipment has been taken down and the area is now ready to be made good in time for the contractors to start work building the new pieces of play equipment; once again, a tremendous effort from your Parish Councillors demolishing and clearing up. They hope that the contractors will be able to start to install the new equipment at the end of summer.

All of this has been made possible by The National Lottery Community Fund giving the project a generous grant which the

Parish Council hopes to match fund. Another grant has come from West Devon Borough Council. The new equipment will be up to modern safety standards and should be enjoyed by future generations of children.

I will end with an appeal - does anybody know the whereabouts of a missing parish Boundary Stone? The Peter Tavy Boundary Stone at Hillbridge has gone missing! It was already broken in two, but has since been moved and cannot be found anywhere near its original location. If you know where it is, could you please contact anybody on the Parish Council to let them know? It is easy to spot because it was a large granite stone in two pieces and with a large letter P carved into it.

I hope you all enjoy what is left of the summer, and that the sun might shine on the village for a good August Bank Holiday with lots of great activities planned for that day.


Peter Tavy Open Gardens in aid of Cancer Research UK and the Village Hall took place on Sunday 9th July.

TEALOAF

Ingredients:

- 1lb (450g) mixed dried fruit, such as currants, raisins, chopped dried apricots and dried cherries
 - 10 fl oz (300ml) cold strong tea
 - 7oz (200g) dark brown sugar
 - grated rind and juice of 1 small orange
 - •grated rind and juice of 1 lemon
 - •1 egg, lightly beaten
 - 7oz (200g) plain flour
 - •1 tbsp baking powder
 - 1/8 tsp salt

Method:

- 1. In a bowl, mix the dried fruit with the cold tea and soak overnight.
- 2. Preheat oven to 350° F / 180° C / Gas 4. Line the bottom and side of a 9 x 5 inch (23 x 13 cm) loaf tin with greaseproof paper, and grease the paper.
- 3. Strain the fruit, reserving the liquid. In a bowl, combine the sugar, orange and lemon rind, and fruit.
- 4. Pour the orange and lemon juice into a measuring jug; if the quantity is less than 8 fl oz. (250 ml), top up with the soaking liquid.
- 5. Stir the citrus juices and lightly beaten egg into the dried fruit mixture.
- 6. In another bowl, sift together the flour, baking powder and salt. Stir into the fruit mixture until blended.
- 7. Transfer to the prepared loaf tin and bake until a skewer inserted in the centre of the loaf comes out clean about 1 ½ hours.

Let stand 10 minutes before unmoulding.






Well, there's the line of a song if ever there was one! Celine Dion perhaps?

THE CAMINO EXPERIENCE

The **Camino de Santiago** is a network of historical pilgrimage routes throughout Europe that lead to Santiago de Compostela in Spain, the traditional burial place of St James, the Apostle. The Spanish word *camino* can be translated as trail, path, road or even journey, but 'way' is considered a more accurate translation. In September last year Lin and I took a ferry to Santander and then walked along the northern coast of Spain to Santiago, part of the *Camino del Norte*, covering 489 kms over four weeks. This was our third pilgrimage: the first a short week from Sarria to Santiago (117 kms) in 2018, followed by a two week, coastal walk from Porto to Santiago (280 kms) in 2019.

Rather than a remote wilderness trek, the Camino weaves through villages, towns and even large cities, with many cafes along the way. The pace is your own, as is the amount you carry! The routes are well-trodden enough that you can be practically guaranteed walking companions in any season other than winter! Since the Camino routes were used for religious pilgrimage, any walker is generally considered a pilgrim (*Pelligrino/Pelligrini*) even if walking more for sport than spirituality.




In May this year we travelled to Italy and walked from Lucca to Rome (404 kms), a part of the *Via Francigena* which traces the footsteps of the Archbishop of Canterbury, Bishop Sigeric who, while returning from Rome in 990, recorded his route and overnight stops. In contrast to Spain there were few pilgrims on the route and major towns are positioned on high ground which proved challenging after a long, gruelling day of walking. Tuscany was awash with vineyards and beautiful countryside while the volcanic tufa stone ridges and basins of Lazio were full of hazelnut orchards. The route ends in Saint Peter's Square, Rome (left).

This year we will return to Spain in September to complete the *Camino Ingles* from Ferrol to Santiago (some 117 kms). This was traditionally the route taken by pilgrims from Northern Europe, Britain and Ireland - hence the name "*English Way*". We then plan to extend the walk from Santiago to Finisterre and Muxia along the wild Costa da Morte of Galicia with the promise of lovely ocean views, mysterious shaded forests touched by Celtic and pagan roots of the region, and the lighthouse at "the end of the world"!

Our pilgrimage adventures started after watching 'The Way', a film starring Martin Sheen, directed, produced and written by his son, Emilio Estevez.
