Bible Reading: Ephesians 3:14-21

For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name. I pray that, according to the riches of his glory, he may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through his Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love. I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.

Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, for ever and ever. Amen.

Reflection

What an incredible passage of Scripture this is! St. Paul's prayer for the early Christian community at Ephesus marks the mid-point of his letter to them, and is the moment he moves from discussing what Christ has done for us to what we are to do for Christ in response. Making this connection inspires us, just as it did his first readers, to step boldly forward as a church to serve and glorify God. The heart of this prayer is that Christians will be empowered and united in this work.

Paul's reminder to us that 'every family in heaven and on earth takes its name' from our Father God is vital to our grasping our identity in Him. Family names, handed down through generations, often communicate something deep-rooted about who we are or where we are from.

Exploring this with local worshippers recently, I've learned that Palmers were named for their participation in the Crusades, bringing palm branches back from the Middle East, while Tuckers were named for their role in preparing sheep's wool in preparation for conversion into garments. We Shillabeers, as it turns out, have Devon roots going back hundreds of years – so perhaps we are not the most adventurous types! – but our name does speak of where we are from.

The culture into which Paul was writing would have known the significance of a family name. To take on a name – as a son usually would from his father – would also make the recipient a representative of the giver. To deal with a son coming in his father's name would be to deal in effect with the father himself, so to state that every family takes their name from God the Father is not just saying that He created us, but that we are now to represent Him, being made in His image, and blessed with His love. And as *every family* may claim this, it's a message for the whole world!

This amazing blessing is so big that there's no exhausting it, no escaping it. God's grace has such *breadth* that it covers our whole human experience, wherever we are and whatever we are doing. There isn't an aspect of our lives God doesn't know or can't work in.

The *length* of God's fellowship with us continues so far as to go beyond our earthly lifetime, so that we never outgrow it or outlive it. He is the God of eternal life, calling us to join Him. The *height* of God's blessing reaches up to the very highest points in our lives, where we feel moments of transcendent joy and fulfilment. In these moments, God is with us on the mountain-top.

Yet the *depth* of His love for us is so great, that however low we feel, however deep in despair or difficulty, He is surrounding us still. The supply of His mercy and peace is endless.

Being 'filled with the fulness of God' is to begin to understand this for ourselves. We aren't built to understand it fully, but rather to be filled with awe at what God has done, and continues to do, in our lives. We're called to respond to this knowledge in worship and service as a faithful church community, and in the following passages Paul goes on to explain how wise use of spiritual gifts provides a firm foundation for this mission.

We may feel limited by our time, physical capabilities or resources, but we all are able to join in this work of bringing glory to God. Being made in His image and taking His name, we are all called to a life of praise and prayer, and to allow God to bring blessing to others through us, in ways beyond our imagining.

Prayer

Gracious God, whose goodness and mercy extend far beyond our understanding or imagination, we ask that by your grace You would help us to know you better each day, growing closer to You, and being inspired to seek your will in our lives, so that others would catch a glimpse of who You are, and that You would be glorified. Amen.
