DEVONSHIRE SPLITS (or "Tuffs" to some...)

With thanks to Marjorie (Midge) Alford for this recipe **Ingredients:**

- 1 lb (450g) strong white flour 1½ level teaspoons salt
- 3 oz (85g) butter or margarine ½ oz (15g) dried yeast

- 1 teaspoon sugar
- Approx. ½ pint (285ml) warm milk

Method:

- 1. Rub in the flour, salt and butter / margarine.
- 2. Add the yeast and sugar to the mix. Then the milk, and mix to a firm dough
- 4. Turn out on to a floured surface and kneed well.
- 5. Place in a warm place and allow to rise for about an hour or until the dough has doubled in size.
- 7. Turn out the dough on to a floured surface and divide in to roll size pieces and shape in to a ball. Space well apart on a large greased baking sheet. Cover loosely and leave to rise again for around 20 minutes.
- 8. Bake in a pre-heated oven at 210°C for 10 minutes until risen and pale golden. Transfer to a wire rack to cool.



Taking place on the day of the Village Fayre, the race is now in its 22nd year and has become a part of the running calendar.

Organised by Dave Chanter, the run starts and finishes in Peter Tavy. The 5-mile route of the "Plod" follows moorland paths and bridleways, offering stunning views while passing interesting landmarks.

Starting at 12.45pm, just before the Plod, the junior "Peter Tavy Mile" fun run also covers a multi-terrain course.


There are medals for all finishers, with prize-giving taking place at the Peter Tavy Inn, who have supported the race since its inception.





At other monthly meetings we have been talking some DIY jobs in the village. Please look out for the Autumn programme on Facebook or on the notice board.


Men's Sheds is open to any men of the village. Please come and join us with the activities, having a chat and a laugh at the same time. - David Dodd

The profits made support Joseph in Kenya through *Compassion UK* and it was recently decided that surplus funds should be sent to *Hope in Action (FAST) Romania*.

As a result, the recent visiting team - Graham, Prim, Anna and David - took a £500 donation from the Chapel to support Alina and her team working with the Roma children and families. We were incredibly blessed to also take a large personal donation from our congregation plus some smaller amounts totalling a further £695. Alina was overwhelmed by the monetary gift and, having visited the Chapel and Circuit in 2023, wanted to thank all who so generously had given.

Following a conversation about our Soup Lunches, our Romanian friends are surprised their favourite soup has yet to appear on the menu - Tripe Soup! Graciously we have tasted it in Romania and although it wasn't as bad as anticipated, we don't think it will be so popular in the UK.

The money taken out to Romania will be used to replace the floor in the Tarlungeni Mission House which has suffered water damage over the years.

St. PETER's CHURCH NEWS

After several years of being without a Parish Priest, we are delighted to announce some exciting news from the Parish Church - which is that we now have two!

On 1st July 2025, Peter Tavy formally became part of a new Benefice (i.e. a group of connected parishes), called the

"Benefice of Bere Ferrers with Bere Alston, Brent Tor, Gulworthy, Mary Tavy, Peter Tavy, Tavistock and Whitchurch" – which is a bit of a mouthful, so the working name is simply the Tavistock Area Mission Community.

Mission Communities are the Diocese of Exeter's chosen way of approaching mission and ministry. They are not a legal unit within Church of England structures. Instead, their purpose is to group parishes together, such that they form a critical mass that can offer the life of the Church of England in all its fullness in a particular place.

So, Peter Tavy remains a Parish in its own right but, importantly, this new ecclesiastical structure (the Benefice) is also what's called a 'Team Ministry', which means that we now have two stipendiary clergy, Rev'd Matt Godfrey, as Team Rector, and Rev'd Nick Law, as Team Vicar. Alongside them, we have three Assistant Curates, Rev'd Hazel Butland, Rev'd Judith Blowey and Rev'd Karen Sharland. Moreover, this core team continues to be supported by a wider team of clergy and lay ministers, many of whom have been helping to cover services at St Peter's over the last 18 months and who will be familiar faces.

What does all this mean in practice? Well, it marks the start of a new chapter in the life of the Church in our Parish. It also signals a new, collaborative way of working, in which parishes work together to share the good news of God's transforming love across the area. Rev'ds Matt and Nick both believe that being part of something bigger, and the opportuities for pooling resources and sharing skills, will generate energy and momentum. An example might be how we can develop our ministry with children, families and young people – as we seek to do what the Archdeacon of Plymouth challenged us to do at last year's Visitation, notably to "grow the Church younger".

No decisions have yet been made about how we're going to do this, but we are determined to forge ahead. Hence, last week lots of people from the seven PCCs, (Parochial Church Councils), along with some of the ministers, met to start talking and praying about what this might look like in practice. One thing that was decided upon was to set up a steering group to take this forward.

One new thing we'd like to try is worshipping together on a (fairly) regular basis. The first such opportunity for us to do this will be on Sunday, 31st August, when the only service across the Benefice will be a joint service at 10.30am at St Andrew's, Bere Ferrers. The idea is that this will rotate around the churches of our Mission Community.

To celebrate the launch of the Tavistock Area Mission Community, there will be joint service at St Eustachius's Church, Tavistock, on All Saints' Sunday (2nd

November) at 10am, at which the Archdeacon of Plymouth will preach. This will be followed by refreshments and, hopefully, a photo of everyone to mark this exciting, historic occasion.

It's not like years ago though, when you could stop and put the world to rights with your neighbour out of the Land Rover window. Try that now and white van man would get very upset! Many conversations in the rural community are not always light in content, but froth is absolutely essential to act as a medium for heavier news to filter in

Not being a regular shopper, I miss out on the chance of seeing a familiar face in the aisle or at the checkout, and when people say 'get out more', it's not vacuous advice. Still, my wife's account of who she might have come across does provide grist for the mill, and whilst it's not exactly gleaned from 'in town' any more, any recounted conversation is always welcome. That said, going to market has to be the best place for a farmer to join his regiment of the human army. There's nothing like it for sharing news, having a joke, meeting up with the market chaplain and yes, shooting the breeze with someone you only half know and can't quite remember their name, but in whose company you're more than happy.

Lately the importance of these age old interactions has been increasingly rediscovered across a broad swathe of society. There are Knit and Natter groups, Men in Sheds, telephone helplines, and community networks to mention but a few, all of which can only do good.

There are those who would deride pointless chitchat as gassing and wasting time, but I think it's they who miss the point. For the soldiers of all nationalities who went to fight and fall *In Flanders Fields* all those years ago, they would have known only too well its true value, when "short days ago they still lived, felt dawn and saw the sunset glow".


